

FEATURED ARTIST:

SALLY LINCOLN

"Art is the lie that reveals the truth."

Turistas reflects Sally Lincoln's experience living in Ecuador, just two miles from the Turi prison, during a series of brutal and unprecedented massacres. Like Goya's The Third of May 1808, this piece is grounded in real events yet transcends them, probing our primal human response to the deeply unacceptable. Faced with the unimaginable, our minds instinctively construct narratives to make sense of it.

"But then I think, we're all tourists looking at this world—not wanting to see too much and telling ourselves if we do see too much, that it's different at home," says Sally Lincoln.



SALLY LINCOLN ABOUT HER ART: I DON'T KNOW WHAT POSSESSES ME TO CREATE. MY "WORK" DOESN'T FEEL LIKE IT'S ANYTHING TO DO WITH ME- JUST MY HANDS DOING WHAT NEEDS TO BE DONE. THAT'S NOT TO SAY THAT IT'S EASY, OR EFFORTLESS, BUT IT'S SIMPLE IF I CAN GET MYSELF OUT OF THE WAY.

I'VE DONE A FAIR BIT OF PAINTING OVER THE LAST 35 YEARS, SOME SCULPTURE AND A LITTLE WORK IN TEXTILES- THE IDEAS GET THROUGH WHEREVER THEY FIND THEIR WAY, LIKE WATER. SOMETIMES I CAN PROVIDE THE CONDUIT, SOMETIMES NOT, IN WHICH CASE. I'M PRETTY SURE THOSE IDEAS GO AND TRY AGAIN SOMEWHERE ELSE.





ABOUT THE ROOF & DICK BUILDING BEFORE

The Roof & Dick Building, home to the Museum of Friends, was designed by architect Francis W. Cooper and constructed between 1907-1910. Born in New York in 1849, Cooper graduated from Cornell in 1881 and later moved to Pueblo, where he founded a successful architectural firm. By 1896, he was working in Walsenburg, and in 1907, Fred G. Roof and George Dick commissioned him to design the building at 6th and Main Street. Made of pressed brick, it has housed various businesses, including the Huerfano Trading Company (1910-1926) and JC Penney, which moved in fully by 1932. In 1940, modifications were made to accommodate JC Penney, including an addition and changes to the storefront and interior. Cooper also designed a brick mansion for James B. Dick in 1911.

As President of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) in Colorado, Francis W. Cooper was instrumental in establishing the Western Mountain Region (WMR). Prior to 1892, the AIA, founded in 1857, had no chapters in this area. The first to be formed was the Colorado Chapter, which covered the states of Arizona, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. By 1900, two Colorado architects, Robert S. Roeschlaub and Cooper, had been named AIA Fellows—Cooper earned his fellowship when the Western Association of Architects (WAA) merged with the AIA in 1889. Cooper's architectural legacy includes the design of Pueblo's Mechanics Building, now listed on the National Register of Historic Places, as well as several residences for prominent local figures. At that time, the only other AIA Fellow from the WMR was J. S. Mathews of Cheyenne, with no further Fellows from the region elevated for the next forty years

The Roof and Dick building is listed on the Colorado State Register of Historic Properties and is significant under Criterion A for Commerce, with a period of significance from 1910 to 1985. During this time, it anchored downtown Walsenburg, housing stores like JC Penney, Ben Franklin, and Duckwalls'. This designation highlights the building's continuous use and presence in the area. Today the building is repurposed as the Museum of Friends.

The Museum of Friends is dedicated to showcasing exhibits that support and uplift vulnerable and underrepresented communities in our town and surrounding areas. By celebrating our unique history and art, we create a space for reflection, learning, and engagement through thought-provoking exhibitions and educational initiatives.

This restoration project involves six phases, is funded by History Colorado's State Historical Fund and is realized by the architects Barbara and Bruce Darden:

- Masonry and Stone Restoration Completed
- Window and Door Restoration Grant submitted (October 1, 2024)
- Storefront Restoration and Emergency Egress
- Interior Rehabilitation (3 phases)
